5530 Biofabrication of Microphysiological Systems

U G 3

Application of adv. tissue engineering and biofabrication methods in developing and implementing models of biology and disease such as organoids and organ-on-a-chip platforms. Course will cover topics such as shortcomings of traditional models in biomedical research and how engineered microphysiological systems can address these limitations to further research to clinical and commercial settings.
Prereq: 4310, 4510 or 4610; or grad standing; or permission of instructor.

Facilitates high-level inquiry for a capstone project within experiential media design. Practice synthesizing, integrating, and applying learned processes, technology and techniques, formulating research inquiries, exploring and identifying a problem space, gathering data to inform and guide design, in the development of the capstone project.
Prereq: Design 4156.

Autumn 2027 Semester

5206 Research Methods for Experiential Media Design

U G 3

Learn traditional and innovative research methods for design development, problem diagnosis, opportunity identification. Conduct research that deeply informs content and delivery choices for experiential media. Design engagement strategies for participation and agency, and develop effective audience profiles.

Prereq: Design 3200; or permission of instructor.

Autumn 2027 Semester

5806 Contemporary Issues in Experiential Media Design 2

U G 3

Advanced analysis of contemporary experiential media design across the spectrum of producers. Focuses on advanced research methods for identifying, analyzing, and comparing current issues and working design processes pertinent to design, media and technology contexts through readings, writings, discussions and viewings of existing and emerging work by those in related fields.

Prereq: 4806; or permission of instructor.

4840 Biodiversity Biotechnology

U 3

Focusing on the the study of natural biochemical discovery, biomaterial engineering, and bioinspired design through the exploration of natural biodiversity. Topics will connect biodiversity to biotechnology discoveries from natural ecosystems, natural history data to biotechnology applications, and examine conservation of biodiversity as a means to preserve biotechnology potential.

5797.12 Sustainable Natural Resource Management in the Neotropics

U G 3

This course will focus on the interface of humans & natural systems in the biodiverse region of the Yucatan Peninsula, Mexico. We will explore the ecology of the flora & fauna, including the millions of migratory birds that visit the region each year, & examine how humans impact these natural systems & gain experience with the trade-offs in land-sparing & land-sharing approaches to conservation.

Prereq: 3300, 3300E, 2501, 2501E, AEDEcon 2501 or 2501E; or permission of instructor; and admission to the Sustainable Natural Resource Management global education program.

5651 User Experience Design for Health Technology

U G 3

Students develop the ability to understand how health information technology is designed and implemented to aid clinical work, as well as how to improve user experience, usefulness, usability, workflow, and compliance with intended use. Course uses active learning and case studies.

Prereq: Enrollment in the Usability and User Experience in Health Care (UUEH) certificate program at the undergraduate or graduate level.

5842.02 Model-Based Systems Engineering

U G 3

This course will provide an understanding of the essential concepts, practices, and applications of System Architecture, and how Systems Engineering models can be used to design and deploy a system. The students will be able to apply systems architecture and Model-Based Systems Engineering (MBSE) to model the different types of systems. For the online professional Master of Systems Engr.

This course will provide students with a substantive and practical understanding of trade secret law and its growing importance as a form of intellectual property.

Pathology**PATHOL****Spring 2027 Semester****5200 Introduction to Anatomical Pathology****U G M 2**

This is a graduate level course consisting of laboratory observation, microscope observation, and discussions, covering various areas in Anatomic Pathology, meant to prepare the student to better understand what is needed in digital pathology.

Spring 2027 Semester**5211 Digital Pathology****U G M 4**

This is a graduate level course consisting of lectures/seminars, covering various subjects and recent advances in digital pathology. Reading will be from primary sources in current scientific literature.

Plant Pathology**PLNTPH****Autumn 2027 Semester****3934 Symbiosis in Nature****U 3**

Symbioses are intimate interactions between organisms driving biodiversity and enabling biosphere functions like nutrient cycling in forests, coral reefs, and deep-sea vents. They regulate human, animal, and plant immune systems and comprise key ecological roles for fungi and microbes. Ancient symbioses shaped complex life and geological features, inspiring sustainable tech, arts, and politics.

3550 Cosmetic Science: Beauty Beyond Skin Deep

This class educates students about the cosmetic products and ingredients society uses daily. Withdraw Course**French****FRENCH****Summer 2026 Term****1101.61 Beginning French I: Individualized DL****U** 1 - 4

Individualized introduction to French via distance learning; development of listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills. Taught in French. Course not open to native speakers, students with EM credit, or to students with two or more years of study in this language in high school.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for 1101.01, 1101.21, or 4 cr hrs of 1101.51 or 1101.61. Repeatable to a maximum of 4 cr hrs or 4 completions.

Summer 2026 Term**1102.61 Beginning French II: Individualized DL****U 1 - 4**

Continued individualized study of French via distance learning; development of listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills; readings based on contemporary French culture and literature. Taught in French.

Prereq: 1101.01, 1101.21, or 4 cr hrs of 1101.51 or 1101.61, or French Placement Level 8. Not open to students with credit for 1102.01, 1102.21, or 4 cr hrs of 1102.51 or 1102.61. Repeatable to a maximum of 4 completions or 4 cr hrs.

Summer 2026 Term**1103.61 Beginning French III: Individualized DL****U 1 - 4**

Continued development of listening, speaking, reading and writing with an emphasis on oral and written skills; focus on functional topics and thematic vocabulary. Taught in French via distance learning.

Prereq: 1102.01, 1102.21, 1155.01, 1155.21, or 4 cr hrs of 1102.51 or 1102.61, or French Placement Level 7. Not open to students with credit for 1103.01, 1103.02, 1103.21, or 4 cr hrs of 1103.51 or 1103.61. Repeatable to a maximum of 4 cr hrs or 4 completions.

Teaching and Learning Literacies, Literature and L**TLLLL****Spring 2027 Semester****7324 Literary Theory and Adolescent Literature****G 3**

Explores the application of diverse theories to young adult literature for in-depth literary study in secondary classrooms.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 7324.

Spring 2027 Semester**7361 Literature in Early Childhood Education****G 3**

Analysis and study of fiction and nonfiction for children age 2-8; emphasis on the importance of early exposure to literature for language acquisition visual literacy, and cognitive and affective development.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 7361.

Spring 2027 Semester**7393 Teaching Writing****G 2 - 6**

Serves as the Summer Institute of the Columbus Area Writing Project. It focuses on improving the teaching of writing for experienced teachers of all subject areas in grades K-16.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 7393.

Spring 2027 Semester**7447 Leveraging Literacies and Technologies for Social Change****G 3**

As policy makers, researchers, Ed tech companies, data analysts, students, and educators' express interest, hopes, and concerns about teaching and learning with digital tools, we will use this course as a space to investigate research, curriculum, and policy as it relates to literacy and technology.

Prereq: Admission to the Ed.D or Ph.D program in the Department of Teaching and Learning; or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for EduTL 7447.

Spring 2027 Semester**8301 Perspectives on Literacies and English Language Arts****G 3**

Critical examination of trends and issues in research and theory on adolescent, post-secondary, and community literacies.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 8301.

Spring 2027 Semester**8307 History of Children's and Young Adult Literature****G 3**

A seminar focusing on the history of American and English Children's literature from earliest times to the present.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 8307.

Spring 2027 Semester

8334 Research Methods for Literature for Children and Young Adults

G 4

Immerses students in the methodology, practice, and application of conducting academic research in the field of Literature for Children and Young Adults. The class will aid in their professionalization by having students explore an array of peer-reviewed journals, a variety of major national as well as international conferences, and current scholarly trends in the field.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 8334.

Spring 2027 Semester

8421 Guided Survey of Research in Reading

G 3

Explores various investigations of reading and literacy. It examines major trends in reading/literacy research and exemplary studies that address major topics, including methodological issues, basic processes, and instructional practices.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 8421. Repeatable to a maximum of 6 cr hrs.

Spring 2027 Semester

8426 Advanced Study in Reading Difficulties of Young Children

G 3

Current thinking on reading and learning processes relative to young, low progress, "at risk" students, and seminal research and theories which have influenced the reading difficulties field will be related to students who are difficult to teach.

Prereq: Not open to students with credit for EduTL 8426.
