8882 Secondary Data Analysis in HDFS

G 3

We will become familiar with old and new methods historians now use for analyzing and showcasing their data, including digital humanities strategies and tools.

Topics include the land of Egypt and its people, art and writing, international relations, women and children, religion and ritual, the legacy of ancient Egypt and more.

1100 Neuroscience Survey

U

Introduces students to the Neuroscience curriculum, explores degree requirements, develops a personalized academic/vocational plan, aids in professional development, familiarizes students with academic resources and support services, and establishes a relationship with an academic advisor.

Prereq: Enrollment as a Full or Pre-Major in the Neuroscience Undergraduate Program; or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for NRO 1100H, Neurosc 1100 or 1100H.

1100H Neuroscience Honors Survey

U 1

Introduces students to the Neuroscience curriculum, explores degree requirements, develops a personalized academic/vocational plan, aids in professional development, familiarizes students with academic resources and support services, and establishes a relationship with an academic advisor.

Prereq: Honors standing; and enrollment as a Full or Pre-Major in the Neuroscience Undergraduate Program; or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for Neurosc 1100 or 1100H.

U 1 - 10

Provides neuroscience majors with an opportunity to intern in a professional setting to integrate academic knowledge with experience in the world of work. Maximum 3 credit hours from any combination of approved 4998, 3191, and/or 3193 may be applied to the undergraduate neuroscience major.

4998 Undergraduate Research in Neuroscience

U 1 - 7

Supervised collaborative research in neuroscience.

Prereq: Permission of instructor. Repeatable to a maximum of 7 cr hrs or 7 completions. This course is graded \$/II

3011.01 Digital Activism

3011.02 Social Media Rhetoric

U 3

This course examines the everyday rhetoric of social media, focusing on how people use social media to engage in the public sphere, to form communities, and to encounter other political, cultural, and global communities.

3019 The Language of Place: Interpreting our Surroundings

U 3

This is a course in the rhetorical theory and analysis of space and place as meaningful human product. Students examine the rhetorical purpose and effect of space and place as concept or idea, specific location, as metaphor, metonym, or icon, as local marker or national or global landmark, and learn to appreciate how the visuo-spatial experience of places and spaces profoundly impacts our lives.

Prereq: English 1110.xx; or GE foundation writing and info literacy course. GE theme lived environments course.

Autumn 2025 Semester

3020 Writing About Sustainability

U 3

This course asks students to consider their place in the natural world by conducting primary and secondary research, analyzing data, composing and revising written arguments, and becoming more proficient with the conventions of academic discourses. We will employ rhetorical theory as one approach to engage in advanced, in-depth, and scholarly investigations about sustainability.

Prereq: English 1110.xx; or GE foundation writing and info literacy course. GE theme sustainability course.

3022 Media Sustainability

U 3

This course explores the sustainability of digital media infrastructure and its impact on the environment as well as the social and cultural effects of the web, analyzing the ecological impacts of producing and maintaining digital devices and the internet, the human cost of modern manufacturing practices, and the social and cultural upheavals caused by digital computing and networking.

3031 Rhetorics of Health, Illness, and Wellness

U 3

Students examine rhetorical concepts and how rhetorical devices construct our understanding of our bodies, health and wellness. Students learn how power structures and ideologies enable commonplace rhetorical devices to structure normative beliefs about bodies, health, and wellness and how rhetoric shapes perceptions of health and wellness and makes and unmakes healthy bodies, including your own.

Autumn 2025 Semester

3110 Citizenship, Justice, and Diversity in Literatures, Cultures, and Media

U 3

Since the beginning of the modern nation state, cultural texts (poems, novels, films, pamphlets, zines, short stories, advertisements, comics, etc.) have been the essential medium through which the discourse of citizenship has been developed, constructed, refined, and debated. In this course student examine a range of literary periods, genres, and media focused on citizenship and social justice.

3161 Drug Use & Addiction in Literature

U 3

Through literature students will discover the history of the human experience with substance use and abuse, and learn how literary texts provide human beings with unique tools to describe, explain, and analyze the complicated relationship between people and drugs.

3260 Poetry and Transformation

U 3

This course will study poetry as a form that offers a particular way of engaging with both the self and the world. Students will explore poetry across multiple media and from different places and times.

3262 Adaptation and Literature

3271 Structure of the English Language

U 3

Students learn basic characteristics of English linguistics focusing on the basic building blocks of language; the sounds of English and how they are put together, word formation processes, and rules for combining words into utterances/sentences. Students investigate and explore linguistic variation, accents of American English, and the implications of language evaluation in educational settings.

Prereq: English 1110.xx; or GE foundation writing and info literacy course. Not open to students with credit for 4570 or 2271. GE cultures and ideas course. GE foundation historical and cultural studies course.

3340 Reimagining Climate Change

U 3
